

2019 Rat Control Report

For the past 14 years Southland Branch NZDA has undertaken a rat control project at Mason Bay Stewart Island in conjunction with Dept of Conservation. 2019 was the busiest year we have experienced for some time but six teams managed to complete their trap checking tasks between August at intervals between August and December.

Rats were everywhere. Our teams accounted for 1150 rats. This huge number of rats that won't be bothering nesting birds in the target area. Our previous highest total rats killed was 665 rats ten years ago. Due to the number of rats and the west conditions the earlier teams did not set the cat cages. Only two cats were caught in traps. Cats were taking rats from the rat traps before the trappers could get to them. Most parties caught up with at least one deer during their trip and new member Ashley Bragg got her first whitetail deer.

Thanks to all our rat trappers and a huge thank you to Gerald at Invercargill Hunting and Fishing Store for his sponsorship toward the flight costs to and from Mason Bay.

First Rat Patrol

Ashley Bragg is a new lady branch member. When we circulated we were needing a replacement for the September Rat control team at Mason Bay Stewart Island she was the first to put her hand up to volunteer. Here is her report and she did get her first whitetail deer.

'As a proud mainlander with a genuine concern for the future of our native species and landscapes, it was with great enthusiasm I accepted the opportunity to brave weather conditions and be part of the September collective of rap trapping on Stewart Island. There are little opportunities in life that are as rewarding and as fulfilling as rat trapping at Stewart Island has been and will continue to be. Alongside the impressive scenery, histories, kiwi and whitetail sightings this trip was only enhanced by the wonderful company, Karen and Dave are incredible individuals and it did not take long to establish ourselves as a team. As with all rewards, there were a number of challenges including the weather which postponed our return to Invercargill by a day. Overall the trip was a success with over 180 rats depleted from Steward Island's ecosystem, giving more survival opportunities to local flora and fauna - however this trip by no means eradicated the problem, but the continuation of these excursions can provide on-going relief. This hands - on opportunity, exceeded every expectation and when this opportunity becomes available again I will be first in line, as well as encouraging others to join - as they say it takes everyone to do a little, not one person to do it all before change becomes a reality. Your fitness, footwear and comfort will be tested, but you will be rewarded with a wealth of privileges exclusive to opportunities like this! Many thanks,

James McIntosh lived in Invercargill and was better know in hunting circles as Jimmy Mac. He had tremendous knowledge of New Zealand flora and was recognised for his studies and knowledge on NZ short tailed bats. The details of his taking this record book Wapiti have passed into hunting unknown and for many years the trophy hung in Southland Acclimatisation Society rooms. (Now Fish & Game). It did not come to light again until after the record book had been printed. A shame really as it is it is number 25 on the over 400 Club. McIntosh was a great friend of the late Allan Harrison and the two travelled to Wet Jacket Arm also in 1951 where McIntosh shot a cow moose, much to Harrison's disgust. Prior to the trip McIntosh built a collapsible canoe for their use in the sounds. This was flown in by float plane and assembled. This canoe now hangs in the Southland Branch clubrooms.

Details of the moose hunt can be found in Chapter Five of Allan Harrisons book "A Deerstalkers Paradise"

Book Review

Chasing Whitetails

By John Delury

This book to summarise in a few words is about Hunting Whitetail deer on Stewart Island. With chapters relating to the various hunting blocks that John has hunted over what amounts to most of his adult life. These blocks are mainly the East Coast Paterson's Inlet and south of and Masons Bay. The book has 256 pages and heaps of good photos of the Island and Whitetail.

John shares his experiences block by block, with some tales of his hunting companions, some of whom have been with him most of his time on the Island. Mixed in with some advice on hunting whitetail that he has acquired from this hunting experience. Not many will have hunted the Island as much as John and his core party has.

John is a Life Member of Southland Branch NZDA, President of Rakiura Hunter Camp Trust, and organiser of the Branch Rat Control Programme at Mason's Bay on the Island. This is the second book written on hunting by a member of the Branch. With Allan Harrison writing "A Deerstalkers Paradise" in 2000.

For me the book is made a lot more interesting as I know John and most of his hunting companions who feature in the book. I have even spent time on the Island with John and some of them. Plus I have hunted some of the blocks that feature in the book. Though I can even claim to have hunted the Island longer. My first trip was in 1977 to Port Adventure, I got my first whitetail then, but only got back twice before this century unlike John. I had other fish to try and fry. John started hunting the Island in 1979.

It is a good read, if one hunts Whitetails on Stewart Island. Also a useful read if one is about to start hunting Whitetails on Stewart Island. Of far more interest to me than reading hunting stories about some country such as the North Island that one has not hunted and can't really envision.

Well done John in writing and publishing this book, I hope it sells out for you and becomes a collectable Hunting Book. Good value at \$40.00 plus postage and packaging from John Delury. Sorry you won't find it at your local book shop or on line other than by e-mail at "wtd243@gmail.com"


Book for Sale

"Chasing Whitetails" The magic of hunting Stewart Island.

In 1979 I went on my first hunt on Stewart Island and quickly developed a passion for hunting whitetail deer. Since that first hunt I have been to the Island more than one hundred times. This book documents some of those hunts. The history of our whitetail has always interested me and there is reason to question the origins of our deer. There has been a lot of misinformation published over the years about whitetail deer and I have tried to set the record straight by including a section on the habits of the deer themselves at the end of most chapters.

There is a chapter on our study into the movements of whitetails we captured and released at Mason Bay and other research done over the years. It details the history of Rakiura Hunter Camp Trust of which I have been chairman since it began building and maintaining huts for hunters on the Island in 2000. Something unique in New Zealand hunting of which I am very proud and has been universally accepted by whitetail hunters.

My book deals only with Stewart Island and has 256 pages on high quality paper with 158 colour pictures, a few b/w, maps and diagrams. The binding has been stitched.



The book is only available from me. Cost is \$40. All books will be bubble wrapped, cardboard protected and sealed in a NZ Post bag.
