

Editorial

What is a threatened or at risk of extinction species? I see whitebait are considered such. 

Branch Trophies

This is a series of articles on the branch trophies found in the club rooms, with two others at Wapiti Lodge. (*Note I thought there was only one trophy at the Wapiti lodge until staying at it this year*)

Willis McRae Red Deer

Albert Burn 1936 15 points (8 + 7) Douglas Score 334 ¹/₂



Willis McRae and his brother Findlay along with J Woods and Andrew Cowie were inaugural members of New Zealand Deerstalkers Association. During the 1930's a number of prominent Southlander deerstalkers, including Arthur Hamilton and Geoffry Orbell attended an annual dinner in Invercargill. In 1937 they presented the idea of forming an association. In May 1938, at Elmwood Gardens, 120 deerstalkers gathered for the 'official' forming of the New Zealand Deerstalkers Association. At a special dinner held at the Elmwood in 1987, Geoffrey Orbell said "technically I suppose 1938 was the legal start but in fact it all began in 1937."

This Red Deer head was on display at the 1937 dinner. In 1999 the head came up for auction at Thompsons auction rooms. The branch was successful at \$320 but it could have been much cheaper as the only other bidder was another branch member who did not know we wanted to buy it.
